

Sahl al-Tustari

Introduction

Sahl al-Tustari was one of the earliest and most important Muslim mystics, born in 818 CE in Persia. From childhood, he showed signs of deep spirituality and devotion to Allah. He dedicated his entire life to worship, self-discipline, and spreading spiritual teachings. His life became a model for later Sufis who followed the same path of simplicity and devotion.

Early Life

His ideas inspired great mystics like Junayd of Baghdad and many others. His mystical interpretation of the Qur'an opened a new way of understanding the holy text. He also contributed to spiritual psychology in Islam, teaching how the soul can grow closer to Allah through discipline and awareness.

Legacy

Sahl al-Tustari's legacy continued through his students and writings. His teachings shaped later Sufi orders and became part of Islamic spirituality.
