

The Objectives Resolution (1949)

Introduction

The Objectives Resolution was presented by Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan and passed by the Constituent Assembly on 12 March 1949. It was the first step towards building Pakistan's constitutional framework. The Resolution declared that sovereignty belongs to Allah and that the authority of the state would be exercised by the people through their elected representatives. It set Pakistan on the path of becoming both an Islamic and democratic state.

Key Features
