

Titu Mir and His Struggle Against the British

Early Life and Background

Titu Mir's real name was Syed Mir Nisar Ali. He was born in 1782 in Bengal to a poor family. Despite his modest background, he gained respect as a religious scholar and preacher. Death and Legacy

In 1831, the British attacked Titu Mir's bamboo fort with cannons and a large army. Despite brave resistance, the fort was destroyed and Titu Mir was killed in battle.
