International Government Support

Many countries help Pakistan during big disasters. Nations like the USA, China, and Turkey send tents, medical supplies, and rescue teams. They also give financial aid to rebuild houses, hospitals, and roads. Some countries share weather data to help Pakistan predict storms better. This global support makes recovery faster and stronger.

Role of International Agencies and NGOs

Agencies such as the UN, UNICEF, WHO, and the Red Crescent provide food, clean water, vaccines, and temporary shelters. The World Bank and Asian Development Bank give money for long-term rebuilding. NGOs like Edhi and Al-Khidmat run ambulances, rescue services, and distribute ration bags. These groups work together to reduce suffering and rebuild communities.

Community and Individual Actions

Local people also play a very important role. They help neighbors evacuate, donate food and clothes, and share warnings through social media. Fishermen and volunteers use their own boats for rescue work. Youth groups collect donations and clean damaged areas. Community support makes recovery faster and gives hope to affected families.
